SOCIETY RECEIVES VINTAGE CAMERA COLLECTION

In October 2014, Verna Poorbaugh called Alpine Historical Society President Carol Morrison to ask if the Society would be interested in a collection of vintage cameras owned by her late brother Fred Bray. Carol, of course, was delighted to take a look at the collection.

Fred and his brother lived on Patrick Drive in Harbison Canyon for many years and they had a long time fascination for cameras from the late 19th century, from wood and metal view cameras to modern day plastic digital cameras. Their collection included what seemed to be at least one of each kind of camera ever made. That may be an exaggeration, but seeing that house full of cameras was absolutely eye-popping! Some of the camera names might be recognizable such as Eastman-Kodak, Graflex, Wollensak and Korona. while other not-sofamiliar names include Conley, Unicum and Rembrandt. Most of the cameras were made in the USA, but one camera, the Instantograph, was made by J. Lancaster & Son of Birmingham, England.

The Historical Society could not possibly catalogue, maintain and display all the cameras, so we agreed to accept 24 of the oldest cameras, ones that might have been used in early Alpine or San Diego. We

are currently researching the cameras in preparation for an exhibit later this year that will feature "Vintage Cameras from the Fred Bray Collection". If you or someone you know is an expert (or just enthusiastically interested) in vintage cameras like the ones pictured here, please send an email message to property@ alpinehistory.org. We would love to get some expert input on these fascinating objects.
















MEDICINAL HERB DISCOVERY WALK

When he brought them to the museum he had 79 nutcrackers bedecked in costumes that interpret a variety of animals, vocations, military, fairy tales, folk

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UPDATE ON "DOCTOR'S BUGGY" RESTORATION

ebruary marks the one year anniversary of our pre-1906 "Doctor's Buggy" restoration. Perhaps you recall that in January 2013, the Alpine Historical Society put out a call for donations to purchase a buggy for the museum. We had a great response from our members and others in Alpine, raising a little over \$3,000—enough

to purchase a decent buggy. But, then Don Walker called to offer a buggy that his family owned when they operated the Willows Resort. Don told us the buggy had been stored away in his barn for many years, and it just needed a little restoration. President Carol Morrison readily accepted the gift buggy and we moved it to the Carriage House at the museum.

Our first task was to have the rubber restored on the wheels. This was done by a wheelwright in Escondido for a modest cost in April 2013.

Next we began our condition assessment of the artifact and what we found is that it was truly in remarkable condition —a bit shabby and well worn—but structurally in excellent condition. We talked with experts all around the country for advice on how to proceed and discovered that we either needed to tackle a major portion with museum volunteers, or we needed to raise a lot more money.

Finally, by February 2014, we made our decision. We assembled a core team of four volunteers (Norm Kling, Ed Morrison, Tom Myers, Bill Waterworth) with skills in almost every field imaginable—but not in buggy restoration. Nevertheless we jumped right in (with help from other volunteers along the way) with enthusiasm, documenting the existing condition and determining existing paint and pin stripe details. In the one year since we started hands-on work, we have disassembled the buggy, scraped, sanded, repaired, filled, sanded again, and primed and painted almost all of the wood and metal elements of the buggy.

However, some things we could not do, so the sanded and painted seat is now in the hands of an upholstery expert for restoration, and we will soon be working with a pinstriping craftsman to restore the vintage paint details.

It will not be long before the job of reassembling the buggy can begin, and we hope to have it ready to show in time for our Annual History Celebration in June.


