

DR. SOPHRONIA NICHOLS RETURNS TO ALPINE OCTOBER 18!

POTLUCK LUNCHEON & PRESENTATION
SUNDAY, OCTOBER 18, 2015

Alpine's most famous doctor, **Sophronia Nichols**, who established Alpine's very first physician's office in 1896, will return through a reenactment presentation by her great-great-granddaughter, **Donna Sisson**. Donna, who very closely resembles Sophronia Nichols, will be dressed in period attire to give us a glimpse into the life and legacy of her great-great-grandmother. The presentation takes place in the year 1885, when Dr. Nichols comes to Alpine to visit her sister, Carrie Foss.

The engaging and inspiring tale that unfolds explores Dr. Nichols' background, her travels, and introduces some of the people who inspired her and contributed to forming her outlook on life. Through extensive research of early family writings, Donna has been able to crystalize the essence of Dr. Sophronia Nichols, and has received standing ovations from delighted audiences. This is a "must see" program for everyone interested in the history and heritage of Alpine.

Donna Sisson is a Life Member of the Alpine Historical Society and a frequent visitor to Alpine. She works for the National Park Service at the Grand Teton National Park. Her biography is an equally inspiring tale and snippets of her life journey can be found on page 4.

REMEMBERING “JACK” WILSON

John K. “Jack” Wilson, the first child of Gordon and Mava Wilson, was born on November 20, 1922 in Spirit River, Alberta, Canada. There he grew up loving horses and hockey. When the family moved to Alpine in 1936, Jack stayed behind in Canada with his horse, *Shiner*, for a little longer before joining them in 1937. He became a U.S. citizen in 1940, and in 1943 enlisted in the Army, receiving five medals

while serving in Northern France and Africa. He returned after the war to study business at SDSU and served in the Air Force Reserves from 1950 to 1953.

In Alpine, Jack spent much of his time helping his father at the Alpine Store, which many still call the *Wilson Store*. Jack assumed management of the store in 1953, and operated it until 1964.

One day when Jack was working for his dad, a lovely young

woman came in the store and Jack was so impressed with her that he declared “That’s the woman I will marry.” And so he did. On May 6, 1951, Jack married Mimi Schaeffer and they had 64 wonderful years together before Jack’s death on July 17, 2015. Jack Wilson is survived by his wife, Mimi; daughter, Karen Wiley; son, Kirk Wilson; three grandchildren, Neal, Claire, and Christopher; his brother, Stan; and his sisters, Dr. Gail Guth and Jean Christianson.

Jack was a Life Member of the Alpine Historical Society. We greatly appreciate his support for the society and service to our community. We believe that Alpine is a better place because Jack and his family lived here.



AN UNSOLVED HISTORY MYSTERY

We received the nicest note from **Karen Wiley** on August 28, saying that she enjoyed visiting the *Alpine History Museum* when she was in San Diego for the memorial service of her father, Jack Wilson. Karen sent us a generous contribution in memory of her father and she sent us an unsolved mystery as well. Here’s what she said:

“I’ve enclosed a scan of a photo composite I took several years ago at the old store—when it was an Indian arts shop. The sign was in the back room where the butcher shop used to be. I understand the sign has gone missing, so here at least, is photographic evidence of its existence.”

A BRIEF BIOGRAPHY OF AN AMAZING WOMAN

We came to know Donna as the great-great-granddaughter of Dr. Sophronia Nichols, but Donna has had her own amazing and inspiring journey through life.

She grew up in Omaha, Nebraska, daughter of a pathologist and a nurse, studied business at the University of Nebraska, Lincoln, and earned a master's degree in business at the University of Texas at Austin. During her college years she was a competitive bicycle racer in both road racing and cyclocross. She studied and worked abroad in the Czech Republic as part of her graduate school studies and upon her return to the U.S.

traveled to California in search of employment—a migration route she shares with her great-great-grandmother.

In 1998 she embarked on a two-year road trip to test her rock-climbing skills at various rock climbing destinations in the U.S. This naturally led her to Yosemite National Park, a rock climber's paradise. There she started her career with the National Park Service as a Search and Rescue Technician, conducting high-angle technical rescue, swift-water rescue, emergency medical response, helicopter rappel and search response to assist Yosemite visitors who found themselves in trouble.

At the end of 2003 she combined her business background with her love of the outdoors and her interest in cultural and natural resources, working first at the Danali National Park in Alaska, then returning to Yosemite in 2009 to serve as the superintendent's liaison to gateway communities. Four years later she transferred to the Grand Teton National Park to manage the park's concessioners and other commercial operators who provide lodging, food service, mountain guide services, fishing and floating trips, guided hiking and bicycling trips, and similar operations.



"It is because I believe there is value in connecting with our history, and because of my family connection that I am inspired to study Dr. Nichols story and attempt to make it come alive for myself and others. I am indebted to the Alpine Historical Society and am honored to join them as a caretaker of the Sophronia Nichols' story."

"The stories of our ancestors help us to understand our culture and ourselves and they also connect us to the landscapes and physical resources around us. Through history, we make a deeper connection with both the present and the future."

HISTORICAL SOCIETY RECEIVES MAJOR COUNTY GRANT



San Diego County has awarded a *Community Enhancement Grant* to the Alpine Historical Society for the fiscal year beginning June 2015. The funds will be used for three critical maintenance projects at the John DeWitt museum facilities.

Nichols Porch Repair

In November 2014, a wind storm broke several large branches from the eucalyptus tree on Tavern Road, causing damage to the Nichols porch. The structure and painted finishes will be repaired with new material. We are thankful that the County Department of Public Works has already removed the eucalyptus tree that caused the damage.

Eucalyptus Tree Removal

A very large eucalyptus tree growing within ten feet of the Carriage House/Caretaker's Residence poses threats from falling limbs to this vintage structure and has already caused upheaval damage to the foundation. This tree will be removed in order to protect the building and its occupants.

Beaty House Roof Repair

The Beaty House roof has exceeded its expected lifetime and is showing signs of severe deterioration. In order to protect the Beaty House structure and the museum artifacts and exhibits inside, we will hire a contractor to replace the roof and flashing materials to ensure a continued watertight building.

We are working with contractors to establish a work schedule for these three projects, and we expect to begin work soon. Next time you pass the museum and see the work in progress, you can thank your County Board of Supervisors, especially **Dianne Jacob**, for their continued support of your Alpine History Museum.
